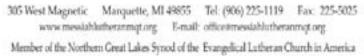

Siblings in Christ,

Can you believe that we're at the end of the first month of 2021?! Thus far it hasn't been quite the year many of us anticipated: violent insurrection, a second impeachment, and a muted if hopeful inauguration, not to mention virus variants and a slower-than-anticipated vaccination rollout. All of this and more has contributed to a bit of a sense of disappointment thus far in the new year. As a friend of mine said, "if 2021 were a product I'd recently purchased, I'd be inclined to send it back after my "30-day free trial.""

The weight of the world has loomed large, especially as we have sought to continue to care for and love one another. More than any year in my memory, I feel a yearning for Lent. As Rev. Lisle Garrity writes, "In Lent, we're reminded that, again and again, suffering and brokenness find us. We doubt again, we lament again, we mess up again. Again and again, the story of Jesus on the cross repeats—every time lives are taken unjustly, every time the powerful choose corruption and violence, every time individuals forget how to love. With exacerbation we exclaim, "Again?! How long, O God?" And yet, in the midst of the motion blur chaos of our lives, God offers a sacred refrain: "I choose you, I love you, I will lead you to repair." Again and again, God breaks the cycle and offers us a new way forward."

It is a message that we all need to hear. It is also the theme for our worship during Lent: Again & Again. Together we come to God again and again with our prayers, our dreams, our hopes, and our doubts. We choose each other again and again.

In that spirit, I invite you to participate in the Lenten Racial Equity Challenge that the Northern Great Lakes Synod is hosting, and that Pr. Molly and I developed. It is an opportunity to learn, to stretch, and to live into the sacred refrain, "I choose you, I love you, I will lead you to repair." I encourage you to read more about it in this newsletter or on the Northern Great Lakes synod website (nglsynod.org). The details can also be found on our Facebook page and website. Whether you are able to participate daily or just a few times, I encourage you to consider joining us in this challenge.

Also, I want to draw your attention to the Diversity Common Reading book that Northern Michigan University is undertaking: "Between the World and Me," by Ta-Nehisi Coates. The university has some wonderful events (online and open to the public) planned for the coming months. You can find that schedule and those details here: https://www.nmu.edu/diversitycommittee/reading

Pr. Molly and I are taking a break from our book studies during Lent with the hope that you will consider joining the Lenten Racial Equity Challenge and/or reading Ta-Nehisi Coates' book. We look forward to walking with you in those journeys and to the conversations they bring!

As we turn to February, and Lent, I pray that you will hear God's refrain; "I choose you, I love you, I will lead you to repair." Together we move forward into the days, weeks, and months of 2021 knowing that God is before us, always offering us new ways forward.

2021 Annual Meeting & Report

Due to the pandemic, our Council has decided to reschedule our annual meeting for a future date in June or July. While a remote (Zoom) meeting was discussed at length, Council believes that any congregational meeting should allow all members to participate. The 2020 Annual Report has been compiled and will be shared electronically (email and our website) by February 10th. If you wish to receive a paper copy by mail, please contact the church office.

Messiah's Council has approved a preliminary 2021 budget that will be included in the report. Formal approval of that budget and the election of Council & committee members will take place at the rescheduled meeting. Ordinarily, Council would approve the budget at the January meeting and the congregation would vote on it at the annual meeting (in late January/early February). This year, Council will approve the budget in January, but it will not be voted on by the congregation until the summer. There are no major changes to the budget anticipated and a narrative description of the budget will accompany it and the 2020 annual report. The Council/church will operate with the preliminary budget and Council and committee members will serve extended terms (they have voluntarily agreed to do so!) until the rescheduled meeting. Lenten 40-Day Racial Equity Challenge

This Lent, you are invited to participate in a synod-wide Racial Equity Challenge. You may remember our 21-day challenge from May and June, and now Pr. Molly and Pr. Andrew are working with the synod to broaden the participation, include indigenous resources, and deepen the conversation.

Participating in the Racial Equity Challenge is a personal commitment to devote time every day during Lent to engage in provided resources about the history and impact of racism, and the ways that bias, prejudice, privilege, and oppression show up in our everyday lives. Each day of the challenge will be a new opportunity to consider different voices and perspectives—a time to read, watch, listen, and learn. It is a time for self-examination and honesty. It is a time to open ourselves to the Holy Spirit, to be remade as vessels for God's love and reconciliation.

We hope that you will consider joining others across our Synod in guided conversations. The Challenge will begin February 18th and run through the week preceding Holy Week. Each participant will access the Challenge material online and be encouraged, but not required, to join a small group that will meet weekly for conversation via ZOOM. Lutheran World Relief-Baby Care Kit Collection

Last year through your help and generosity we were able to put together $\underline{46}$ baby care kits.

LWR had asked that whatever anyone had and if able, could they send them. In November, they were taken to Fortune Lake and from there shipped to LWR. The need is always there. We will start our 2021 collection in February.

We have depleted our inventory completely and will be collecting these items:

- + lightweight cotton T-shirts (no onesies) sizes 12-24 months
- + long or short sleeved gowns or sleepters (without feet) sizes 12-24 months hand towels, dark colored
- + bath-size bars of Ivory soap equaling 8-9 oz, in original wrapping receiving blankets (could be crocheted or knitted with lightweight yarn up to 52 inches square)
- + jacket, sweater or sweatshirt with hood or include a baby cap
- + cloth diapers, flat-fold preferred
- + pair of socks
- + diaper pins or large safety pins

Monetary donations for baby care kits are also welcomed and may be dropped off or mailed to the church office. Rachel Circle appreciates your contributions to this effort. We thank you in advance for your help. There is a collection bin by the office.

Messiah Council Highlights - January 2021

Our Messiah Church Council met virtually on January 21. Highlights of Council action and discussion were:

2020 Finances and 2021 Budget

The Council is deeply appreciative of the continued financial support of the congregation! We entered 2020 projecting a deficit & ended the year in strong financial shape with a surplus due to the generosity of our members, friends and assorted gifts. During the year, we have been able to fund over \$20,000 in new equipment that broadens our streaming capabilities and improves the audio and video quality of our services. We are reaching more people through our radio and live streams—estimated at 1000 per week and more. We also were able to contribute a major gift to Room At The Inn, supporting their recent renovation project.

Our 2021 Budget was approved by Council, and awaits congregational approval at our next Annual Meeting. We will be adjourning our Annual Meeting until all have the option to attend in summer or fall. Until then, the Council will be operating under the boundaries established in Messiah's Constitution.

Re-Opening Plan

Council approved allowing small groups of up to 10 to meet, providing the State guidelines allow. Currently, that is NOT the case, but Council will hear an update at the February 18 Council meeting.

Pastoral Goals

Council received the Pastoral staff's goals for 2021. The goal areas were Worship, Outreach, Christian Education and Personal. The Pastors will keep us updated with progress towards these goals as we move through the year. Council is pleased that we have such wonderful pastors, and thanks them for their creativity and resourcefulness in 2020. Despite the pandemic and its effects, ministry lives at Messiah and the work of the Lord continues! Praise God!

A Letter from Biship Katherine Finegan

Dear Northern Great Lakes Synod,

There is a scene from the movie, The Shawshank Redemption where the protagonist, Andy, is convicted of a crime he did not commit. He spends some 30 years in a dreadful prison until finally he escapes to begin a new life in a little oceanside village in Mexico. He sends a letter to his inmate friend, Red, and invites him to join him after Red is paroled from his own lifetime sentence for a regrettable crime he committed in his youth.

As we watch Red ride a bus towards Mexico, we hear his voice say, "I find I am so excited I can hardly keep a thought in my head. I hope I can make it across the border. I hope to see my friend and shake his hand. I hope the Pacific is as blue as it has been in my dreams. I hope."

Hope is a powerful force. It pulls us forward through the present as we reach for a different future. It was hope that made Andy's and Red's prison time more bearable. And it is hope for so much that pulls us forward from our present circumstances toward a future that promises:

- an end to the pandemic.
- gathering around tables with coffee-filled cups and bakery in hand.
- laughter and conversation once again filling fellowship halls, restaurants, and living rooms.
- voices raised in songs of praise, in harmony, with great gusto.
- ministry without masks.

I can hardly wait!

I Corinthians 13:13 proclaims, "And now these three remain: faith, hope and love. But the greatest of these is love."

The greatest of these IS love. But this year, in the year of our Lord 2021, our theme will focus on HOPE. Make no mistake, we need love and faith too. But right now, we really need HOPE.

As I write this, the inauguration looms large. Plans for armed and potentially violent demonstrations outside each state's capitol building are being reported, and the U.S. Joint Chiefs of Staff has issued a public reminder to all military branches of their oath to defend the Constitution. It is more than a little unsettling that they felt such a reminder was necessary.

By the time you read this, whatever happens next week and before the end of January will be in the past. We all will have watched the news, heard the reports, and prayed over what right now has not happened yet.

And still, whatever is going to happen, does not change what we have always proclaimed to be true, that our hope is in the Lord Jesus Christ. What that means for our present circumstances has taken on more urgency. The

more we feel the chaos and uncertainty of our present, the more we reach for that which is true and solid and constant.

I hope we find a way towards healing, in our congregations and in our nation. I hope as people of faith we have a witness that is authentic to the gospel message of Jesus. I hope our congregations and pastoral leaders can hold on a little longer. I hope.

"O God our help in ages past Our hope for years to come Our shelter from the stormy blast And our eternal home."

The Year of Discovery, Part One: The Americas Before Columbus

You have already heard that 2020-21 has been disignated a "Year of Discover" for our Northern Great Lakes Synod. The goal is to learn more about our native American neighbors, the original inhabitants of the American continents, and to recognize the impact of the European "Doctrine of Discover" on their history, and on the history of the United States of America.

I've found that a great starting point for this effort is a book by Charles Mann titled 1491: New Revelations of the Americas before Columbus, published in 2012 by Alfred A. Knopf. Mann's goal is to describe the new understanding of civilization in the Americas before the coming of the Europeans, and the ways in which those civilizations were destroyed by disease, warfare, and the introduction of livestock from the old world. His book unravels the myth of a continent "empty of mankind and its works" that has prevailed in American history for 500 years. He calls this myth "Holmberg's Mistake," named for Allan R. Holmberg, who promoted the idea that primitive stone-age natives were sprinkled across the Americas for several milennia, waiting for Europeans to arrive and bring them culture and civilization. It is a myth that stretches back to the early days of the American republic, and was propagated by a series of American historians. This historical distortion also goes back to the Doctrine of Discovery, which began with a papal bull issued in 1943.

"In 1943, after Christopher Columbus' fateful voyage, Pope Alexander VI issued the bull Inter Caetera which granted Ferdinancd and Isabella "full and free power, authoity, and jurisdiction of every kind," over al most all of the Americas, save for a portion of modern-day Brazil and a few island outposts."

This pronouncement from the papacy became the basis for international law, and for the definition of legal sovereignty in North & South America, Australia, and New Zealand. In U.S. history, it was used as the basis for what is called the Marshall Trilogy, three Supreme Court rulings that define the relationship of the Native American nations to the United States and individual Americans.

Here are some of the interesting take-aways from Charles Mann's **1491**: **1.** The Americas were thickly populated before Columbus: in 1491, somewhere between 90 & 110 million people lived on the two American continents. This is more than the total population of Europe at that point in history. Cities in the Americas, including Aztecs, Incas and the city of Cahokia in present day Illinois, were larger than London.

2. The American Indians engaged in a sophisticated agricultural society, which meant most of them lived in settled communities. Crops included squash, beans, peppers, tobacco, and the amazing crop maize (no one knows how it was domesticated from the wild teosinte) and in South America, potatoes and manioc. Maize is really the key to understanding the native American civilizations.

- **3.** The Americas lacked large domesticated animals like the horse and oxen, and Indians never developed the wheel for use as a tool in agriculture or transportation (wheels were only used as children's toys). Large European animals put the native Americans at an immediate disadvantage, and the rapid expansion of imported pigs *which became wild boars) disrupted much of the village based agriculture systems.
- **4.** Finally, there is evidence that indigenous Americans have been in the New World for a much longer time than had been previously thought, perhaps since 30,000 B.C. That isolation from Europe and Asia meant that diseases brought by the first Europeans had a devastating effect, wiping out 80-90% of the inhabitants of North America by the year 1600. Smallpox was the worst of the diseases, but measles, influenza, plague, typhoid, and diphtheria all wreaked their havoc. When the English began to settle North America, they found a continent of empty settlements, regrown forests, and a population less than 1/10 of what it had been 100 years earlier.
- **5.** As a result, those early English immigrants to New England and the rest of the eastern seaboard would say that it seemed like "God had miraculously cleared the continent" for their settlement. And the Doctrine of Discovery gave them the legal & theological justification for taking the land, and displacing the small remaining population. Many of them were converted by missionaries to Christianity, those who refused were driven out or killed. The pope's decision settling a dispute between Spain & Portugal became the legal foundation for British and then United States relations with the native peoples of North America.
