### **Centering Prayer - Tuesdays at 11:00 am**

Do you know the meaning of life? Have you accepted the fact that as hard as we work to have a "good" life, it all ends anyway? So, what is the point?

Jesus taught us that the point is to accept God's Love for ourselves, so that we are able to share that love with the world. How do we do that? Jesus modeled for us how to do that. He regularly went to God, Whom Jesus identified as a loving Abba, and listened. Centering prayer

is that kind of approach to God. We humbly acknowledge our ignorance and consent to God's Presence and action within. What we receive is unconditional love and grace, and answers to the questions we didn't know we had. Regular meditation practice opens the mind to new perception and brings the Advocate online to help us through our day-to-day lives.

We may miss the answer to our prayers because we have something specific in mind, when the answer is something more than we can imagine. Centering prayer opens our minds to what we don't know. It is also of benefit to practice with others. For where two or three are gathered in my name, I am there among them. Matthew 18:20

We meet each Tuesday at Messiah from 11-12 noon. You don't have to commit to regular attendance, and you don't need to have ever tried meditation or centering prayer. The practice is simple:

Choose a sacred word as a symbol of your intention to consent to God's presence and action within.

Sitting comfortably and with eyes closed settle briefly and silently introduce the sacred word.

When engaged with thoughts\*, return ever-so-gently to the sacred word.

At the end of the prayer period (typically twenty minutes) remain in silence with eyes closed for a couple of minutes.

\*Thoughts include body sensations, feelings, images and reflections.

## **Benefits of an 11th Step Centering Prayer Practice**

There is a direct linkage among self-examination, meditation, and prayer. Taken separately, these practices can bring much relief and benefit. But when they are logically related and interwoven, the result is an unshakable foundation for life. 12 & 12

The positive effects of the prayer are experienced in daily life and not necessarily during the prayer period itself. Growth happens when we practice

Centering Prayer in the context of the 12 Steps. Some benefits are:

- We enhance our ability to "Let Go and Let God."
- We develop a nonjudgmental attitude of ourselves & others.
- We become more comfortable in our own skin.
- We grow in our capacity to listen and serve others.
- We nurture our ability to live in the present moment

Are you searching for emotional and spiritual sobriety? Whether you have been in recovery for a long time or are just beginning, you have probably experienced many frustrated feelings that

didn't just go away when you got abstinent or sober...problems with relationships, work, anxiety, depression, or feelings of emptiness. These feelings are natural for us regardless of our addiction or time in recovery. But we don't have to let emotions rule our lives. The 11th Step offers us a solution! Through the simple method of Centering Prayer, we can improve our relationship with our Higher Power by simply consenting to our Higher Power's presence and action within us. Centering Prayer is an ancient meditation practice that has been used over the centuries, but it is different from what we may think of as prayer. It is not the type of prayer we are used to, like praying for something we want. It is simply moving deep within ourselves, in silence, saying nothing, asking for nothing, just being, by letting go of our thoughts and allowing our HigherPower to be with us. (taken from 12 Step Centering Prayer brochure.)

A weekly meeting will be starting on Monday, November 4th at 6:00 pm in room 201. This is an open meeting. All are welcome. You do not need to be in a 12-step program to attend. The meeting will begin with settling in with a prayer. A bell will ring at the beginning and end of our 20-minute silence. After our sit, we will read the Prayer of St. Francis. ## **A Daily Guide for the Start of the Year**

### **January 1 – Fresh Start**

Take a moment to reflect on your hopes for the new year. Write down one way you will nurture hope in your life this month.

### **January 2 – A Prayer for the World**

Pray for peace in the world. Ask God, our Creator and Sustainer, to inspire all people to live with compassion and justice.

### January 3 – Share a Kind Word

Reach out to someone you care about with a kind message or compliment. Brighten their day with your words.

### January 4 – Sabbath Rest

Set aside an hour for rest and renewal today. Listen to what your body and spirit need and trust that God delights in your rest.

### January 5 – Blessing of the Home

Pray for your home: “God of love, bless this space and all who dwell here. May it be a haven of hope, love, and peace.”

### January 6 – Epiphany: Light a Candle

On this day when we remember the light of Christ revealed to the world, light a candle and ask God to fill you with hope and courage to share that light.

### January 7 – Love Yourself

Practice self-compassion today. Write down one thing you love about yourself and thank God for creating you so wonderfully.

### January 8 – Acts of Service

Do a small act of service for someone in need today. It could be helping a neighbor, donating to a charity, or volunteering your time.

### January 9 – Hope in Creation

Spend time outside or look at the beauty of nature. Let God’s creation remind you of renewal and resilience.

### January 10 – Send a Note

Write a note of encouragement to someone who might be struggling. Let them know they are seen and loved.

### January 11 – Scripture of Hope

Read Romans 15:13: “May the God of hope fill you with all joy and peace in believing.” Reflect on how God brings hope in your life.

### January 12 – Share a Meal

Invite someone to share a meal with you, whether at home, a café, or a soup kitchen. Break bread together and celebrate community.

### January 13 – Gratitude Journal

Write down three things you are grateful for today. Let gratitude grow your hope.

### January 14 – Pray for the Lonely

Pray for those who feel isolated or unseen, asking God to bring people into their lives to share love and joy.

### January 15 – Love the Neighbor You Disagree With

Think of someone with whom you’ve disagreed. Ask God to help you see them as a beloved child of God.



### January 16 – Renew Your Spirit

Do something that brings you joy and rest—read a book, take a walk, listen to music, or sit in silence with God.

### January 17 – Share Hope with Children

Spend time with a child or pray for the children in your life. Remind them they are loved and cherished by God.

### January 18 – Care for the Vulnerable

Take action to help someone in need today, whether it's donating warm clothing, offering a ride, or simply being a listening ear.

### January 19 – Forgiveness

Is there someone you need to forgive? Pray for the grace to let go of resentment and trust God to heal.

### January 20 – Martin Luther King Jr. Day Reflection

Reflect on how you can work for justice and equality in your community. Ask God for courage to bring love where there is division.

### January 21 – Mindful Breathing

Take 5 minutes to sit quietly and breathe deeply. Imagine God's Spirit filling you with peace and hope.

### January 22 – Reconcile

Reach out to someone with whom you've lost touch or had conflict. Let God guide your words of healing.

### January 23 – Be Still and Know

Sit with Psalm 46:10: "Be still and know that I am God." Let the silence remind you of God's abiding presence.

### January 24 – Random Act of Kindness

Do something kind for a stranger today. It could be holding a door, paying for their coffee, or simply smiling.

### January 25 – Celebrate Community

Reflect on what you value about your church family. Pray for Messiah Lutheran Church and its mission to share love and hope.

### January 26 – Let Go of Worry

Write down something you're worried about. Offer it to God, trusting in the Spirit's presence and peace.

### January 27 – Practice Hospitality

Invite someone into your space or life today—a friend, a neighbor, or a newcomer. Share God's welcome with them.

### January 28 – Give Thanks for Helpers

Thank someone who has been a source of help or encouragement to you. A simple thank-you

note or call can make a difference.

### January 29 – Hope in Scripture

Read Jeremiah 29:11: “For I know the plans I have for you, says the Lord, plans for your welfare and not for harm, to give you a future with hope.”

### January 30 – Care for Yourself

Make time to care for your body, mind, and spirit today—whether it’s a walk, a healthy meal, or quiet time with God.
